

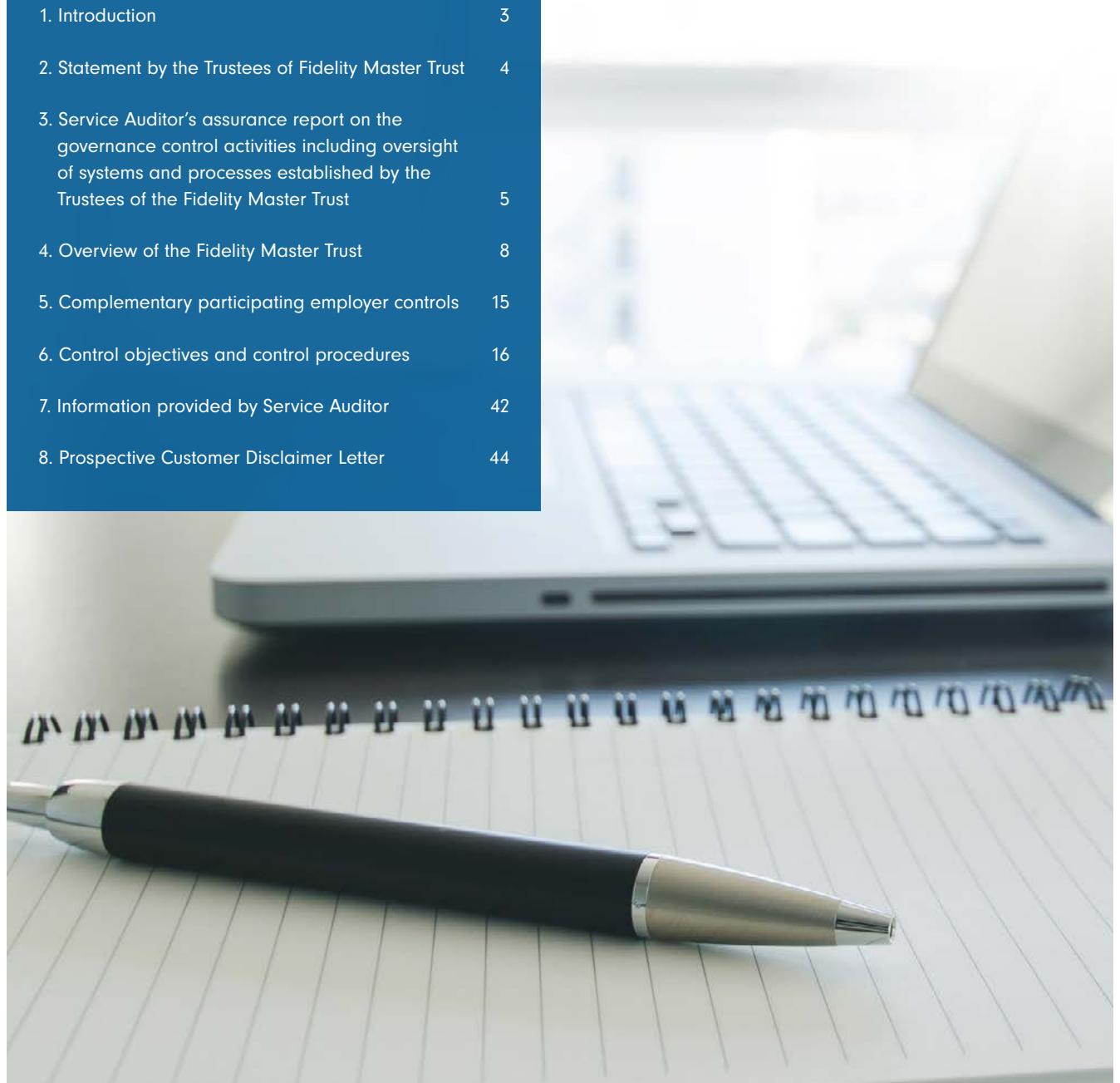

## 1. Introduction

The Trustees of the Fidelity Master Trust ('the Scheme') are pleased to present our report detailing the control procedures that are in place relating to The Scheme.

The Fidelity Master Trust is designed to provide employers with a well governed, value for money pension scheme. It utilises our administrator, Fidelity's, extensive DC platform and member services to support members in achieving their retirement goals. Since the Scheme was launched in December 2013 and as at the date of this report, we have been entrusted with providing pension savings for more than 132,000 members by 115 contributing employers.

The Scheme's Trust Deed and Rules were updated to incorporate the new Master Trust Requirements introduced under the Pension Schemes Act 2017 via a Deed of Amendment dated 7 February 2019. The Fidelity Master Trust received authorisation from The Pensions Regulator (TPR) with effect from 28 June 2019. The Scheme is now subject to TPR's ongoing supervision to ensure we continue to meet the authorisation criteria set out in the Pension Schemes Act 2017. Subsequent Deeds of Amendment introduced further rule changes from 28 May 2021, 25 October 2021 and 4 May 2022.

This report focuses on the Governance control activities operated by the Master Trust Board over the Scheme, which includes monitoring the operational controls undertaken by Fidelity. We are delighted to now provide our sixth Type 2 report covering the year to 30 June 2022, and the second year under the new TECH 05/20.

The purpose of this report is to help our stakeholders understand how we ensure that not only are we compliant with relevant legislation but that we have the necessary controls in place to deliver high quality services to employers and members. The report outlines the specific control procedures that we have in place to support our objectives and with the Independent Service Auditors Assurance Report independently demonstrates the strength of our control environment.

## 2. Statement by the Trustees of Fidelity Master Trust

As the Trustees of the Fidelity Master Trust ('the Scheme'), we are responsible for:

- the identification of control objectives relating to governance of the Scheme; and
- establishing governance control activities including oversight of systems and processes that provide reasonable assurance that the control objectives detailed are achieved.

The control objectives are derived from standards of governance set out in The Pensions Regulator's DC code of practice and DC guides and include the control objectives listed in the ICAEW Technical Release AAF 05/20 "Assurance Reports on Master Trusts" ("TECH 05/20 AAF").

In carrying out these responsibilities, we have regard not only to the interest of employers (who have entrusted their employees' DC contributions to the Scheme or are considering doing so) and members of the Scheme but also to the needs of the Scheme itself and the general effectiveness and efficiency of the relevant operations. In addition, we consider the needs of The Pensions Regulator who may use this report to help determine whether certain governance procedures, including oversight of systems and processes and relevant master trust supervisory requirements, have been met and have been subjected to independent scrutiny. We have evaluated the fairness of the description and suitability of and the effectiveness of the Fidelity Master Trust's governance control activities including oversight of systems and processes having regard to ICAEW's TECH 05/20 AAF and the control objectives set out therein.

We set out in Section 6 of this report a description of the relevant governance control activities including oversight of systems and processes established by the Trustees of the Fidelity Master Trust together with the related control objectives which operated during the year to 30 June 2022. This description has been prepared for employers and members of the Scheme and their auditors, along with other information including information about controls operated by the employers themselves, when assessing the governance control activities of the Scheme. The Trustees confirm that:

- the report describes fairly the governance control activities established by the Trustees that relate to the control objectives referred to above which were in place throughout the year from 1 July 2021 to 30 June 2022; and
- the governance control activities described were suitably designed throughout the year such that there is reasonable assurance that the specified control objectives would be achieved if the described governance control activities were complied with satisfactorily and that the participating employers applied the control procedures contemplated; and
- the governance control activities described were operating with sufficient effectiveness to provide reasonable assurance that the related control objectives were achieved during the year from 1 July 2021 through to 30 June 2022.

### 3. Service Auditor's assurance report on the governance control activities including oversight of systems and processes established by the Trustees of the Fidelity Master Trust

#### To the Trustees of the Fidelity Master Trust ('the Scheme')

##### **Subject matter**

This report covers solely the internal controls of the Master Trust as described in your report for the year to 30 June 2022. Internal controls are processes designed to provide reasonable assurance regarding the level of control over the governance activities over the procedures of the Master Trust.

We have been engaged to report on the description, design and operating effectiveness for the year from 1 July 2021 through to 30 June 2022, of the Fidelity Master Trust's (the "Scheme") control activities and governance designed to achieve the control objectives as set out in Section 6 of your report.

The description indicates that certain control objectives specified in the description can be achieved only if complementary client controls contemplated in the design of the Scheme's controls are suitably designed and operating effectively, along with related controls at the Scheme. We have not evaluated the suitability of the design or the operating effectiveness of such complementary client controls as set out in Section 5 of your report.

#### **Opinion**

In our opinion, in all material respects:

- the accompanying Master Trust's report in section 6 describes fairly the governance control activities that relate to the control objectives referred to above which were in place through the year from 1 July 2021 to 30 June 2022. The control objectives identified include all of those control objectives listed in TECH 05/20 AAF;
- the governance control activities described in section 6 were suitably designed such that there is reasonable, but not absolute, assurance that the specified control objectives would have been achieved if the described control procedures were complied with satisfactorily and that the participating employers applied the complementary employer controls referred to above; and
- the controls tested, which together with the complementary customer controls referred to above, if operating effectively, were those necessary to provide reasonable assurance that the control objectives stated in the description were achieved and operated effectively throughout the year from 1 July 2021 to 30 June 2022.

##### **Trustee's responsibilities**

The Trustee's responsibilities and assertions are set out in Section 2 of the report.

The control objectives stated in the description include those control objectives set out in TECH 05/20 AAF that are considered relevant by the Trustees.

##### **Service Auditor's responsibilities**

Our responsibility as the Independent Service Auditor is to form an independent opinion on the fairness of the presentation of the description and on the suitability of the design and operating effectiveness of the governance control activities, based on the work carried out in relation to the control activities of the Master Trust as described in your report and report this to you.

We conducted our engagement in accordance with International Standard on Assurance Engagements (ISAE) 3000 (UK revised) and with ICAEW Technical Release AAF 05/20 AAF, ISAE 3000 and AAF 05/20. These require, among other things, that we comply with ethical and other professional requirements. We plan and perform our procedures to obtain reasonable assurance about whether, in all material respects, the Scheme's report fairly describes the relevant governance control activities and the control procedures are suitably designed and operating effectively.

The criteria against which the control procedures were evaluated are the control objectives developed for Master Trusts as set out within TECH 05/20 AAF and identified by the Scheme as control objectives to be applied for the purpose of demonstrating governance activities over the Scheme.

Our work involved performing procedures to obtain evidence about the presentation of the Scheme's description of its governance control activities, and the design and operating effectiveness of these governance controls. Our procedures include assessing the risks that the description is not fairly presented, that the control procedures were not suitably designed and that they were not operating effectively. Our procedures also included testing the operating effectiveness of those governance control activities that we considered necessary to obtain reasonable assurance that the control activities stated in the description were achieved. An assurance engagement of this type also includes evaluating the overall presentation of the description, and the suitability of the control objectives stated therein.

We believe that the evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

### **Our independence and quality control**

In carrying out our work, we complied with the ICAEW Code of Ethics, which includes independence and other requirements founded on fundamental principles of integrity, objectivity, professional competence and due care, confidentiality, and professional behaviour.

The firm applies International Standard on Quality Control 1 ("ISQC1") and accordingly maintains a comprehensive system of quality control including documented policies and procedures regarding compliance with ethical requirements, professional standards and applicable legal and regulatory requirements.

### **Inherent limitations**

The Trustees' description of governance control activities including oversight of systems and processes was prepared to meet the common needs of a broad range of users and may not, therefore, include every aspect of the governance control activities that may be relevant to each participating employer company or member of the Scheme.

Also, governance control activities designed to address specified control objectives are subject to inherent limitations and accordingly because of their nature, control procedures of the Master Trust may not prevent or detect and correct all errors or omissions in performing governance activities. Control procedures cannot guarantee protection against (among other things) fraud, especially on the part of those holding positions of authority or trust.

Our opinion is based on historical information. The projection of any evaluation of the fairness of the presentation of the description, or opinion about the suitability of the design or operating effectiveness of the governance control activities and systems and processes, to future periods would be inappropriate.

The information included in Sections 4 and 5 describing the Scheme's overall control environment and business information is presented by the Trustees to provide additional information and is not part of Scheme's governance control activities. Such information has not been subjected to the procedures applied in the engagement to report on the Master Trust's governance control activities and accordingly, we express no opinion on it.

## **Use of Report**

This report is intended solely for and use of the Master Trust (the "Scheme") and their participating employers in accordance with the terms of our engagement letter dated 17 May 2021 (the "agreement"), in order to assist the Scheme to procure such a report, and for no other purpose.

Our report must not be recited or referred to in whole or in part in any other document nor made available, copied or recited to any other party, in any circumstances, without our express prior written permission except in accordance with paragraph 3.2(m) of the agreement. To the fullest extent permitted by law, we do not accept or assume responsibility to anyone other than the Master Trust and its participating employers for our work, for this report or for the opinions we have formed.

## 4. Overview of the Fidelity Master Trust

The Scheme was set up on 13 December 2013 to provide defined contribution benefits to the current and former employees of the Participating Employers. It may also provide benefits to members who have been transferred to the Scheme by the Trustees of another pension scheme.

The Scheme is a registered pension scheme for tax purposes under the Finance Act 2004 (Registered Pension Scheme number 0081028RS).

The Scheme is governed by a Master Trust Board of Trustees ('the Board'). The Board is responsible for ensuring the Scheme is operating in accordance with the Scheme Trust Deed and Rules dated 13 December 2013 and Deeds of Amendment dated 24 June 2016, 18 May 2018, 7 February 2019, 20 May 2019, 28 May 2021, 25 October 2021, and 4 May 2022, together with the Deeds of Participation for each Participating Employer and the Statement of Investment Principles. Participating Employers are able to vary the rules in certain areas and these are set out in the relevant Deed of Participation.

The Deed of Amendment dated 7 February 2019 updated the Scheme's Trust Deed and Rules to incorporate the new Master Trust Requirements introduced under the Pension Schemes Act 2017. The Fidelity Master Trust received authorisation from The Pensions Regulator (TPR) with effect from 28 June 2019. The Scheme is now subject to TPR's ongoing supervision to ensure the Scheme continues to meet the authorisation criteria set out in the Pension Schemes Act 2017.

During the year to 30 June 2022, the Board consisted of six trustees, four of whom were professional trustee companies represented by individuals and independent; this includes the Chair. The Trustee Board meets the independence requirements as defined by the Department for Work and Pensions.

FIL Life Insurance Ltd, Ltd ('Fidelity') is the Scheme Sponsor and is responsible for setting up the Master Trust. Appointment of new Trustees is undertaken by the Trustee Board, with consent of the sponsor, in line with the Trust Deed and Rules of the Scheme.

During the Scheme year, at the request of the Sponsor, the Trustees agreed to move to a fully independent Board. During the second quarter of 2022, the Trustees ran an open and transparent recruitment process in conjunction with Fidelity, by utilising the services of an executive search agency and advertising in the national pensions press. Five applicants were interviewed by a panel representing the Board and Fidelity. The quality of applicants was extremely high, and, after lengthy discussions, a decision was taken to appoint Jill Mackenzie and Colette Dunn with effect from 26 September 2022.

The Trustees in place over the Scheme year and those appointed post period end, along with their skills and experience, are listed below.



**ZEDRA Governance Ltd, as represented by Kim Nash**  
**Independent Trustee and Chair of the Board of Trustees of the Scheme**

Kim Nash is a Director at ZEDRA Governance Ltd (ZEDRA), having joined ZEDRA in February 2012. Kim is a qualified Actuary and an accredited Member of the Association of Professional Pension Trustees, and previously worked for Willis Towers Watson as an actuarial benefit consultant. Kim is able to bring her significant DC experience both as a Trustee and a member of Independent Governance Committees to lead the Scheme's Trustee Board in assessing value for money and make comparisons on Fidelity's performance against the wider market.



**Independent Trustee Services Ltd, as represented by Dianne Day**  
**Independent Trustee**

Dianne Day is a Client Director at Independent Trustee Services Ltd (ITS). She joined ITS in 2015, specialising in DC schemes. Dianne holds the PMI Certificate in DC Governance, is a Fellow of the Financial Services Institute of Australasia and is an accredited Member of the Association of Professional Pension Trustees. She has worked for major investment firms in senior communications and management roles. Dianne applies her extensive DC governance and communications experience to help with the evaluation of Fidelity's member service, communications and engagement programmes. Dianne is also the chair of the Communications Sub-Committee.



**Punter Southall Governance Services Limited, as represented by Gerald Wellesley**  
**Independent Trustee**

Gerald Wellesley is a Professional Trustee and Client Director of Punter Southall Governance Services Limited. He has over 35 years' experience in the finance industry, 15 years as a pension trustee and 3 years in HR management. His current portfolio of trusteeships includes chair, sole trustee and sub-committee positions with DB and DC schemes and DC Master Trusts. He brings strengths in the investment and financial management disciplines, together with broader trustee skills. He was previously at BNY Mellon where he led the corporate strategy. Gerald is also the chair of the Investment Sub-Committee.



**BESTrustees Limited, as represented by Roger Breeden**  
**Independent Trustee (appointed 1 October 2021)**

Roger Breeden is a Trustee Executive with independent trustee company BESTrustees and specialises in workplace Defined Contribution and Master Trust pension schemes. His financial services experience spans more than 40 years, the majority of which was with Mercer where most recently as a Partner he led the launch and successful authorisation of a Master Trust establishing operational and governance systems and processes. He started his career as a personal financial adviser which provided him with day to day experience of the needs of pension scheme members while both building and drawing down on their savings. Roger is the chair of the Administration Sub-Committee.



**Marianne Jaekel**  
**Trustee/Fidelity Representative (resigned 26 September 2022)**

Marianne Jaekel is a qualified solicitor and joined Fidelity in 2012. She is the Head of UK Business Legal department and has responsibility for all legal aspects of Fidelity's UK Business. Prior to joining Fidelity, Marianne gained 13 years of experience as a City lawyer, having qualified at Travers Smith and most recently practising as a Senior Associate in the Pensions team of Squire Patton Boggs (previously Hammonds). Marianne is a full member of the Association of Pension Lawyers.



**James Carter**  
**Trustee/Fidelity representative (resigned 26 September 2022)**

James Carter is Head of Pension Products and Policy at Fidelity with 20 years' experience in the workplace pensions market. He is responsible for the product implementation and management of Fidelity's workplace pension products. James also leads Fidelity's engagement with the government, regulators and industry bodies in the development of pension policy and the business analysis of the impact and opportunities of new pensions regulation. Prior to joining Fidelity, James was a Director in Willis Towers Watson's pension consulting business, having also worked for KPMG and Aon, advising trustees and employers operating large DC pension schemes.



**Jill Mackenzie**  
**Independent Member (appointed 26 September 2022)**

Jill Mackenzie has over 25 years of industry experience and more than ten years' experience as a pension scheme trustee, working across DC and DB. She currently chairs four pension Trustee Boards and most recently spent seven years on the board of Nest Master Trust where she was the Senior Independent Director. She is also a Member of the Pensions Management Institute and holds the PMI Diploma in Pension Trusteeship.



**Colette Dunn**  
**Independent Member (appointed 26 September 2022)**

Colette Dunn is a Non-Executive Director, Strategic Adviser and Professional Coach, with over 30 years' strategy consultancy experience in financial services, focussing on consumers and the retirement market. She has worked for KPMG, Accenture, Milliman and Willis Towers Watson and holds a portfolio of roles, including those from the third sector. She is passionate about ESG and creating equity, diversity and inclusion (EDI), and brings her extensive strategy and consumer experience to the Fidelity Master Trust Board.

## Governance

The Trustees are responsible for the administration and investment policy of the Scheme.

The Trustees meet formally four times a year, and more frequently as required. Under the terms of the Trust Deed, resolutions are passed on a simple majority of those voting, with the Chair having a casting vote when necessary.

The Trustees have a delegation policy covering the payment of retirement benefits, transfers and certain discretionary benefit payments including the authority to make decisions on death, ill-health and serious ill-health cases. The delegation policy is reviewed on a regular basis and delegated decisions are reported at each Trustee meeting.

The Trustees are now subject to TPR's ongoing supervision to ensure the Scheme continues to meet the authorisation criteria set out in the Pension Schemes Act 2017. TPR have published their supervision and enforcement policy which sets out how it will supervise master trusts and use its enforcement powers. All master trusts will be supervised and required to submit an annual supervisory return. The Regulator expects those responsible for running master trusts to be:

- open, honest and transparent in their interactions with TPR, responding promptly to information requests;
- proactively liaise with TPR and volunteer information about material developments, risks and issues in their scheme, which may affect the scheme's ability to continue to meet the authorisation criteria and other obligations;
- satisfy TPR that they continue to meet their obligations and that there is a low risk of them failing to meet their obligations going forward, including providing relevant evidence; and
- proactive in identifying and monitoring risks, and proactive in rectifying any issues that may arise and affect the scheme's ability to continue to meet the authorisation criteria or other obligations.

## Operating model

FIL Life Insurance Ltd, ('Fidelity') is the Scheme Sponsor and is responsible for setting up the Master Trust. Appointment of new Trustees is undertaken by the Trustee Board, with consent of the Sponsor, in line with the Trust Deed and Rules of the Scheme.

The Trustees appointed Fidelity to administer the Scheme and as Scheme Administrator for HMRC purposes on 1 April 2014. Fidelity is responsible for the day-to-day operation of the Scheme including member communications, member and Participating Employer websites, record keeping, allocation of contributions to member funds and payment of benefits.

Under the terms of the Trust Deed, resolutions are passed on a simple majority of those voting, with the Chair having a casting vote when necessary. The Trustees have established three joint sub-committees with the Independent Governance Committee (IGC) of Fidelity which is responsible for oversight of Fidelity's contract-based workplace pension schemes. At 30 June 2022, each Committee comprises of three Trustees, at least two of which are independent Trustees including the independent Chair:

- The joint Communications Sub-Committee (CSC), which allows the Trustees to better understand and influence Fidelity's communication strategy, and to set the strategy for the Trust;
- The joint Investment Sub-Committee (ISC), which allows the Trustees to better understand and influence Fidelity's investment strategy, and to set the strategy for the Trust; and
- The joint Administration Sub-Committee (ASC), which allows the Trustees to better understand, influence and monitor the delivery of Fidelity's administration service.

After the move to a fully independent board, the sub-committees will still comprise of three members, but with a quorum of two.

## Risk management

The Trustees have a Trustee Action Plan which is used to help ensure the Scheme is run efficiently. The Trustees have responsibility for controls and risk management and have identified and logged risks in a risk register. The risk register is used to document the risks to which the Scheme is exposed and to record the likelihood and impact of those risks and the mitigating actions required. The risk register consists of four key areas covering operational, investment, governance and strategic and communication risks, and is updated at least annually or as and when risks are identified or the assessment changes. Details of any changes to the risk register are formally recorded and shared with TPR as part of the annual supervisory return.

The Trustees have completed their own assessment of how the Scheme complies with the DC Code of Practice on the Governance and Administration of Occupational Defined Contribution pension schemes and use this to identify actions and areas of review.

## COVID-19 Pandemic

The Trustees assessed, and monitored, the consequences of the COVID-19 pandemic for the Scheme considering the following areas in particular:

- The administration of benefits by the Scheme's Administrator, FIL Life Insurance Ltd, including their business continuity planning, operational resilience, cyber/IT security measures and the maintenance of their control environment;
- The financial position of the Participating Employers together with the payment of contributions due;
- The effect on the Trustees' investment strategy, the value of the Scheme's assets and the ability to provide sufficient cashflow to support benefit and other payments.

The Trustees are satisfied having assessed these areas that the risks posed to the operation and management of the Scheme and its investments as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic have been sufficiently understood and mitigated where appropriate.

Although the immediate impact of COVID-19 has now passed, the Trustees are aware that a similar event may occur in the future and, as such, continue to review the potential consequences as part of the wider risk process.

## Conflicts of interest

A conflicts of interest policy is in place to assist the Trustees in identifying, managing, and monitoring any actual or potential conflicts of interest which may arise in relation to the Scheme. The Trustees keep a register of interests, and conflicts are considered at the start of each Trustee and Sub-Committee meeting.

## Fidelity Master Trust investments

The Trustees are required to develop and maintain a Statement of Investment Principles ('SIP'), obtaining advice from a regulated investment adviser to ensure that the investments and default strategy proposed are appropriate, consistent with the Pension Regulator framework and likely to achieve optimum outcomes for members.

The SIP has been prepared in accordance with Section 35 of the Pensions Act 1995 and outlines the Scheme's investment objectives and strategy. The Trustees monitor compliance with the SIP. During the year under review, all investments were in accordance with the SIP. ## Standard investment offering

The Master Trust currently offers two default strategies alongside a standard fund range for employers who do not wish to implement a bespoke fund range and whose members have decided not to make an investment choice. For existing employers who onboarded prior to November 2022, the default investment strategy is the FutureWise Working Lifestyle Strategy (WLS). For employers who onboard after November 2022, the default investment strategy is the range of FutureWise Target Date Funds (TDFs). Over 2023, the Master Trust will begin moving members from the FutureWise WLS to the FutureWise TDFs which will be the sole default strategy going forwards. Members who are automatically enrolled are invested in the default strategy for their section until such a time that they make an alternative investment choice. The risk profiles and investment objectives for the default investment strategy funds and all other investment funds can be found on the fund factsheets. The investment objectives of the default strategy funds can also be found in the Scheme literature.

In the early years, the FutureWise WLS aims to generate risk-controlled capital growth. At retirement it is designed to generate a 40% replacement rate (40% of a members' final salary) at retirement over the long-term. In the early years, the FutureWise TDFs are designed to generate capital growth, and at retirement are designed for members who wish to take income drawdown. In addition to the default strategy, there is a range of funds available to members for those who wish to select their own investments. They represent a variety of asset classes including equities, property, multi-asset, fixed income, money market and specialist funds, with both active and passive management. Both strategies use funds managed by Fidelity International and BlackRock.

The Trustees receive advice from their appointed investment adviser regarding the appropriateness of the default strategies and the self-select funds for the membership, including both active and deferred members together with the risk and maturity profile. This advice is reviewed annually, with a full in-depth review carried out at least every three years, or in the event of a significant change, to ensure it remains appropriate. The triennial review was agreed Q3 2022 outside of the Scheme year and the changes noted above were proposed as part of this review.

As part of the trustees' sustainable investing and climate policies, the Trustees believe that the consideration and integration of sustainability factors, including climate change issues, into the investment process for strategies and funds, is likely to lead to improved risk-adjusted returns over the long term, which may lead to better retirement outcomes for members. As such, the trustees work with Fidelity and their advisors to integrate sustainability and climate-related issues into the range of investment options offered to members.

Over 2020 and 2021, the Trustees worked with Fidelity to integrate ESG considerations into the component funds of the FutureWise WLS, using Fidelity's proprietary ESG rating methodology. In designing the range of FutureWise TDFs, Fidelity and BlackRock have integrated their proprietary ESG rating methodologies into the component funds. The FutureWise TDFs are also designed to meet Fidelity's and the Trustees' climate goals of reaching net-zero by 2050 and halving the strategies' carbon footprint by 2030.

There are currently 5 funds with a focus on sustainability available to members:

- Master Trust Sustainable Climate Equity Fund
- Master Trust Sustainable Positive Change Fund
- Master Trust Sustainable Climate Bond Fund
- Master Trust Sustainable Active Equity Fund
- Master Trust Sustainable Passive Equity Fund

## Bespoke investment offering

In addition to the standard fund range, the Scheme can accommodate bespoke default strategies or self-select fund ranges for employers.

Some Participating Employers have introduced bespoke fund ranges and default strategies designed for their section of membership. The Trustees are ultimately responsible for the investment selection for all sections. Where a bespoke range is requested, the Trustees take investment advice to ensure that the proposals are suitable and in accordance with the Scheme's SIP and Investment Framework. Fidelity will also carry out due diligence to ensure that the proposals are deliverable.

If necessary (in conjunction with their investment advisors), the Trustees can remove any investment options that are no longer deemed suitable for Scheme investment, for example where a fund is no longer meeting its objectives or is no longer appropriate for the Scheme's objectives.

The Trustees invest in an insurance policy issued by FIL Life Insurance Ltd, a UK PRA authorised and FCA & PRA regulated life insurance company. The suitability of the insurance policy, and the underlying platform, was confirmed to the Trustees by their independent investment adviser, Isio, in accordance with Section 36 of the Pensions Act 1995.

## Interaction with the Independent Governance Committee

Fidelity has established an Independent Governance Committee (IGC) which is responsible for the interests of policyholders of Fidelity's contract-based workplace personal pension plans. As at 30 June 2022, the independent Trustees of the Master Trust also sit on the IGC. The Trustees have established a joint Communications Sub-Committee with the IGC together with a joint Investment Sub-Committee and Administration Sub-Committee. Each Committee comprises at least three Trustees of whom two must be independent including the independent chair. This enables the Trustees to understand how Fidelity operates across its business and ensure that the service provided to the Master Trust is consistent with best practice in other areas of the business. Any potential conflicts are monitored and reviewed in each quarterly meeting.

After the move to full independence, four members of the Trustee Board also sit on the IGC. The sub-committees will still comprise three members, but with a quorum of two.

## 5. Complementary participating employer controls

The controls for the Scheme relating to governance were designed with the assumption that certain controls would be placed in operation by the participating employers. This section describes controls surrounding the interface and communication that should be in operation at the participating employers to complement the controls of the Scheme.

Specifically, the Scheme's participating employers should establish controls (including related general computer controls where relevant) to ensure that:

- Clients advise the Scheme appropriately of those individuals who require access to the Scheme's website and systems.
- The Scheme only allows access to individuals who need this access
- For each client that requires a higher level of access, a formal Data Sharing Agreement has been approved setting out key responsibilities and the reasons for requiring access to data.

This list does not represent a comprehensive set of all the controls to be employed by the participating employers. Other controls may be required at these organisations, depending upon each individual circumstance.

Note that the Trustees undertake the following additional controls over these complementary controls.

- The Trustees monitor all access to the Scheme's website and systems on an annual basis.
- An audit has been undertaken on a sample basis of compliance with the Data Sharing Agreements.

## 7. Information provided by Service Auditor

The following information includes details of the tests performed by CLA Evelyn Partners Limited on the control procedures documented within this report relating to the Scheme's governance activities.

### Control environment

The control environment represents the collective effect of various factors on establishing, enhancing or mitigating the effectiveness of specific control procedures. In addition to the specific tests described below, our procedures included tests of, or considered the relevant elements of, the Master Trust's control environment including:

- The organisational structure and approach to segregation of duties;
- The functioning of the Trustees and executive management;
- Risk assessment and monitoring activities;
- Personnel policies and practices; and
- Oversight by regulatory authorities.

Tests of the control environment included the following procedures, to the extent that we considered necessary: (a) a review of the Master Trust's organisational structure, including the segregation of functional responsibilities; (b) discussions with management, operations, administrative and other personnel who are responsible for developing, ensuring adherence to and applying control procedures; (c) observations of personnel in the performance of their assigned duties and (d) review of documentation in place.

The control environment was considered in determining the nature, timing and extent of the testing of the operating control procedure relevant to the achievement of the control objectives.

### Controls

We have tested the operating effectiveness of control procedures and have undertaken such tests as we considered necessary in the circumstances to evaluate whether those control procedures, and the extent of compliance with them, were sufficient to provide reasonable, but not absolute, assurance that the specified control objectives were in place and operating effectively throughout the year to 30 June 2022.

Our tests of the operating effectiveness of control procedures were designed to cover a representative number of transactions and procedures throughout the year from 1 July 2021 to 30 June 2022, which were designed to achieve the specified control objectives. In selecting particular tests of the operating effectiveness of the control procedures, we considered: (a) the nature of the control procedures being tested; (b) the types and competence of available evidential matter; (c) the nature of the control objectives to be achieved; (d) the assessed level of control risk; (e) the expected efficiency and effectiveness of the test; and (f) the testing of control procedures relevant to the stated control objective.

Our tests of controls always involve at least one site visit during the year, attendance to at least one Trustee Board meeting and discussions with several of the administration operation team.

### Tests of effectiveness

Tests performed of the design and operating effectiveness of the controls detailed in Section 6 were undertaken on a judgemental basis and are described below:

## Inquiry

Enquired of appropriate personnel seeking relevant information or representation to obtain, among other things:

- Knowledge and additional information regarding the control procedures
- Corroborating evidence of the control procedures
- Inspections of systems documentation, such as operations manuals, flow charts and job descriptions

## Observation

Observed the application of the specific control procedures as represented.

## Inspection

Inspected documents and records indicating performance of the control procedures. This included, among other things:

- Inspection of reconciliations and management reports that age or quantify reconciling items to assess whether balances and reconciling items are properly monitored, controlled and resolved.
- Examination of source documentation and authorisations to verify propriety of transactions processed.
- Examination of documents or records for evidence of performance such as the existence of initials or signatures.
- Inspections of systems documentation, such as operations manuals, flow charts and job descriptions.

## Reperformance

Reperformed the control or processing application of the control to ensure the accuracy of its operation. This includes, among other things:

- Obtained evidence of the arithmetical accuracy and correct processing of transactions by performing independent calculations; and
- Reperforming the matching of various system records by independently matching the same records and comparing reconciling items to the business group's prepared reconciliations.
